

Student Tour



Who Was Mrs. Tom Bowes?

During the weekend of February 1, 2025, a driver had a medical emergency and drove through the fence of the Old Miner's Cemetery and damaged some of the headstones. It is actually named the United Mine Workers of America Cemetery. Wednesday, February 5, I received an email from the news director of KTVQ2. He wanted to know if anybody could meet a Q2 reporter at the cemetery for a story. David Jay met me at the cemetery and we talked about the cemetery, the importance of mining to the community and the fact that many of the people in that cemetery had died during the Spanish Flu epidemic of 1918-1920. I also mentioned to him that the saddest headstone I had ever seen was in this cemetery. The stone says "Mrs. Tom Bowes." I just think it is sad that not even her first name is on the stone.

We then went to the Musselshell Valley Historical Museum and looked at the extensive coal display and a few other exhibits in the museum.

Several people saw the clip on Q2 on the 10:00 PM news on February 5. Thanks to communication through the internet and people's curiosity, I received quite a bit of help in finding the identity of Mrs. Tom Bowes. Her name is Katherine Page Bowes. She was born December 25, 1856, in Columbus, Ohio. Her parents were both born in France. Katherine passed on May 27, 1923 in Roundup at the age of 67. She was listed as a housewife on her death certificate.

Thomas Bowes was born in England on September 23, 1860. He passed on July 20, 1934. He was a coal miner at Number 3 in Roundup. He had lived in the United States for at least 50 years. They lived at No. 3. I did not find any information about children.


It was actually harder to find where Tom was buried. I found a short article of his passing in the Roundup Record-Tribune on July 26, 1934. The problem was that his name was misspelled in the article. He was listed as Thomas Bowers. My "Find a Grave" app on my phone was not providing a burial place for Thomas Bowes. I finally found him on the app at the New Miner's Cemetery across the road and a little south of the Old Miner's Cemetery. He is listed as Thomas Bower. I have not gone to the cemetery to check his name on the headstone because of the snow we have had lately. When some of the snow melts I will make that journey.






Klein Exhibit

Klein was a busy little community from 1900, when the mine opened, until 1956 when it closed. At one time, up to 1,500 people lived in Klein and the surrounding communities. It had a church, post office, boarding house, saloon, and company store. In the museum exhibit, you will find a hand drawn map of the mine and community. There are school sweaters and many sports pictures on display. At one time, there was quite a rivalry between Klein's sports teams and Roundup's.







Wounded Warrior Visit

In October, the museum offered a tour to seven veterans. These veterans were part of the Wounded Warrior Project, and had come to this area for a dinosaur dig. All of the veterans came from southern California, and none had ever been to Montana. They were intrigued by the gun registry from 1918, and enjoyed the mining display and diorama. The military display and badges garnered a lot of interest. When taken to the tack room, interest turned to the McClellan cavalry saddle. Another big point of interest was the Dino Depot. Thomas Hebert was there to give insight on that display. The group spent nearly 2 hours at MVHM, were excited about what they had seen, and enjoyed their visit.





Acquisitions

The museum acquired two notable donations this season. One of the donations was a complete barbershop unit from 1908. The unit includes the original walnut mirror frames, marble shelving, lights, and of course the barber chair. The barbershop was donated by David Hamilton.

A second donation was two complete glass enclosed cabinets displaying a Canada Goose, and another with various, smaller water fowl. The bird displays were donated by Leigh Ann Kristiansen. The cabinets were built by Leigh Ann's father-in-law, Elden Kristiansen, in 1985.





As the Paleontology Collections Manager-Registrar for MOR, Metz was on hand for a workshop on fossil collection, identification, categorization, and preservation. Eric Metz received his undergraduate degrees in earth sciences and secondary education from MSU, and his Masters in geology from the University of Alaska, Fairbanks.

Also, in attendance, were Eric Eliasson and Rob Mihalovich, members of the board of directors for the Musselshell Valley Historical Museum, and currently working on dinosaur digs in the area. Other friends and members of the MVHM board were also in attendance.

The Montana Dinosaur Center in Bynum sent representatives, as did Carter County Museum in Ekalaka. Victor Bjornberg, head of the Montana Dinosaur Trail, and his wife, Marilyn, also attended.


